

Conclusions

- Principles of Legal Empowerment relevant to LA authorities at working at home and abroad:
 - Security of tenure is a human right
 - Widespread, secured and tradable property rights are fundamental to social and economic development
 - All, should have equal right to have their property formally registered and to transact in the formal system
 - Special attention should be taken to ensure the property rights of women, minorities, and displaced persons and refugees
 - Measures should be taken to fight corruption in land administration

Outcome

- 56,3 % considered the workshop to be a major contribution to improved land administration practises in the ECE region
- 43,8 % said presentations being a major contribution to their concrete work
