PREPARATIONS FOR THE CES 2005 PLENARY SESSION

Note prepared by the ECE secretariat

1. Attached is the draft agenda and timetable for the 2005 plenary session for consideration by the Bureau. It is proposed that both the organization of the 2005 plenary session and the organization of the plenary sessions in subsequent years be discussed.

2. **The duration of the session on "Formal business"**. Prior to 2002, the "formal business" session lasted longer than half a day. In 2002, the Conference changed the organization of the CES plenary session and decided that it should consist of three parts: formal business (half a day), a seminar on foundational issues of statistical systems (1 day) and a seminar on emerging issues (1 day).

3. However, since 2002, several projects were launched by the Conference. The presentation of the reports on progress made by the Task Forces and the discussion of the proposed guidelines and recommendations require a certain amount of time at the plenary sessions. Some examples include the Multinational Enterprises Project, Guidelines on Confidentiality and Access to Microdata, and the 2010 Census Recommendations.

4. The in-depth review by the Conference of one statistical area selected by the Bureau also requires time for discussion. In the last years, the two topics that were discussed, Crime statistics (2003) and Environment statistics (2004), led to some recommendations for further work. In October 2004, the Bureau decided that the topic for in-depth discussion in future should be selected after consultation with the CES members, in the same way that the electronic consultation has been organised by the ECE secretariat over the last two years for the selection of the seminars' topics. The discussion of both issues requires time during the plenary session, even if it is only 10 or 15 minutes. Furthermore, it is proposed that, in future, the Conference allocate some time to discuss the Issues and Problems identified in the IP (see document CES/BUR.2005/23 and CES/BUR.2005/37). The "formal business" session also includes the opening address by the Executive Secretary, a paper on the Matters arising from the ECE session and the presentation of the UNSD Director on the outcome of the Statistical Commission.

5. According to the strict UN rules relating to simultaneous interpretation, half a day constitutes only 3 hours including the coffee break, normally of 30 minutes. It is becoming difficult to cover all the issues mentioned above in about 2 hours. The tight schedule imposed by the timetable leaves hardly any time for substantive discussion, especially for an audience of about 150 delegates.

6. <u>The organization of the plenary session in June 2005</u>. The 2005 plenary session will be organised differently in order to accommodate the OECD Statistical Committee. The Conference will open with the first seminar, and the formal business is scheduled for the last, third day. However, some formal issues have to take place at the opening such as: opening addresses (normally about 20 minutes), the presentation of the issues that arise from the annual session of the ECE (10 minutes), and the announcement for the election of a new Bureau this year (5 minutes). All this will eat into the time allocated for the first seminar.

7. The organization of the 2006 plenary session. It is planned to discuss the 2010 Census

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Recommendations at the 2006 plenary session. Ten Task Forces have been proposed and they are already working towards the Recommendations. These recommendations may require a few hours of discussion. Also in 2006, it is expected that the first results of the MNE project will be available for presentation and possible discussion at the plenary session. It is therefore proposed that only one seminar be organised in 2006, or that the second seminar be organized for half a day. Given the criticism expressed by many CES members concerning the conference facilities that were provided in 2004 in Paris, it is important that the venue of the Conference in 2006 be discussed as well.

Proposal: The Bureau is invited to discuss:

- the duration of the "formal business" session in future;
- the organization of the plenary session in 2005 the proposal is attached;
- the organization of the plenary session in 2006, including the venue of the Conference
