VI. SUMMARY OF ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE

In 2015, the UNECE and the UN-Habitat assisted Armenia, Republic of Moldova, Serbia and Tajikistan in the development of National Action Plans for Sustainable Housing and Urban Development (NAPs). Each country established an interagency Steering Committee and a national group of experts to provide guidance and to contribute to the development of NAPs. The NAPs for four beneficiary countries have been developed based on the comprehensive analysis and policy recommendations of the UNECE Country Profiles on Housing and Urban Development ¹. During the reporting period a draft NAP for Serbia was prepared. The Draft NAP formulated a comprehensive and coherent housing policy and consolidated the multiple activities in the area of housing policy. The NAP strengthened cooperation between different key stakeholders in the housing sector (national and local) and established synergies between diverse activities and projects on housing and urban development in Serbia. NAPs for Armenia, Republic of Moldova and Tajikistan are currently being developed and are planned to be completed in 2016.

Three national validation workshops to discuss NAPs were held in Yerevan, Armenia (9 April 2015), Chisinau, the Republic of Moldova (8-9 September 2015), and in Belgrade, Serbia (9-10 November 2015). In the Republic of Moldova the validation workshop was organized back-to-back with the training workshop on sustainable housing (the activity was initially planned for 2014 but was postponed for 2015)². The validation workshops³ brought together representatives of the national Steering Committees, national expert groups and stakeholders (including representatives of local governments, NGOs, academia, private sector and international organizations active in the countries). The validation workshops discussed the proposals for the NAPs based on earlier provided policy recommendations of the country profiles, other studies and available best practices. Following the request of the Government of Armenia, an additional workshop was organized in the town of Goris (9-13 February 2015). The workshop enhanced understanding of housing and urban development challenges at the municipal level.

The training workshop in Chisinau brought together representatives of local authorities from the Republic of Moldova as well as representatives of national authorities and international experts (total over 100 participants). The training developed capacity of local newly elected authorities (the workshop took place

two months after the elections at the municipal level) and contributed to the development of the NAP for Republic of Moldova.

To evaluate the conducted workshops and to plan next steps, bilateral meetings with members of the project Steering Committees and relevant experts representing key national and international organizations were held after the workshops. Findings were documented in the mission reports and are used for planning of future project activities. Information on the project and its activities is disseminated through the UNECE website⁴.

The NAP was focused on promoting energy efficiency of residential buildings and technical control of new construction. Since 2014, Agency of Architecture and Construction was working jointly with the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development on energy efficiency in buildings. especially on the issues of energy efficiency (developing financial mechanisms to promote energy efficiency in multiapartment buildings). In addition, the NAP is focusing on the implementation of the Government Decentralization Strategy aimed at giving more responsibilities and power to local authorities. The National Action Plan for Armenia is currently being developed based on the recommendation from the draft Country Profile prepared by UNECE and submitted to the Government of Armenia. As discussed with the Government, priorities of the NAP are on spatial planning, municipal management and smart cities.
