INTRODUCTION

1. The present Annual Report was adopted unanimously by the Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) at the sixth meeting of its fifty-eighth session on 6 March 2003.

CHAPTER II

WORK OF THE COMMISSION SINCE ITS FIFTY-SEVENTH SESSION

A. <u>Activities of subsidiary bodies</u>

3. A list of meetings held since the fifty-seventh session is contained in Annex I, showing in each case the dates, the officers and the symbols of the report. These reports record the agreements reached and decisions taken.

B. Other activities

4. The secretariat serviced the regular session of the Commission, Ad Hoc Informal Meetings of the Commission, meetings of its subsidiary bodies, and other meetings held under its auspices. Periodic reviews, including the <u>Economic Survey of Europe</u>, specialized statistical bulletins and other publications were issued (see Annex II). The secretariat maintained close and regular liaison with United Nations Headquarters and cooperated with the Departments concerned, as well as with the secretariats of the other regional commissions on projects of common interest.

C. Relations with other United Nations Programmes

5. The cooperation of the Commission and its secretariat in 2002/2003 with various United Nations bodies and other international organizations, as well as with their secretariats, has continued as called for in the Plan of Action.

CHAPTER III

FIFTY-EIGHTH SESSION OF THE COMMISSION

A. Attendance and organization of work

6. The fifty-eighth session of the Commission was held from 4 to 6 March 2003. The Commission heard statements by the Chairman and the Executive Secretary.

7. The fifty-eighth session was attended by representatives from Albania, Andorra, Armenia, Austria, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Canada, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Republic of Moldova, Romania, Russian Federation, SanMarino, Serbia and Montenegro, Slovakia, Sbvenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, The former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and United States of America.

8. The session was attended by representatives of the European Community.

9. Representatives of the Holy See participated under article 8 of the Commission's terms of reference.

10. Representatives of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA), United Nations Regional Commissions New York Office (RCNYO), United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-HABITAT), United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and the following specialized agencies and intergovernmental organizations were in attendance: World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), World Bank, Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), European Free Trade Organization (EFTA), Organization of the Black Sea Economic Cooperation (BSEC), International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.

11. C. Election of Officers

14. The Chairman of the fifty-eighth session of the Commission was Mr. Clyde Kull (Estonia) and the Vice-Chairpersons Mr. Michel Adam (Belgium), Mr. Yaakov Levy (Israel) and Mr. Mykhailo Skuratovskyi (Ukraine).

15. The Rapporteurs of the session were Mr. Peter Storer (Austria) and Mr. Bob Fairweather (United Kingdom).

16. At its sixth meeting the Commission re-elected Mr. Clyde Kull (Estonia) Chairman of the fifty-ninth session. Mr. Vladimir Thanati (Albania), Mr. Sergei Aleinik (Belarus) and Mr. Michel Adam (Belgium) were elected Vice-Chairpersons of the fifty-ninth session.

D. Account of proceedings

Economic developments in the UNECE region

(Agenda item 2)

17. For the consideration of this item the Commission had before it the Economic Survey of Europe 2003 No. 1.

18. The findings of the Economic Survey were introduced by Mr. Dieter Hesse, Director of the Economic Analysis Division of UNECE.

19. In his presentation, Mr. Hesse noted that the global economic development in 2002 had been quite disappointing but economic recovery was expected to start from the second half of 2003. He reported that while growth had been modest in Western Europe and North America, Eastern Europe and the CIS countries had demonstrated moderate to high growth based on strong domestic demand and good export performance. Mr. Hesse then touched upon the prospects for the future.

20. Delegations expressed their appreciation of the academic and practical usefulness of the Survey and made brief comments on the economic situation in their countries and sub-regions, as well as on the section dealing with the impact of EU enlargement on trade and economic relations with non-acceding countries.

21. Some concerns were raised on the relevance and reliability of some of the assessments of Chapter 5 (Progress in Systemic Reforms in the CIS) and on the data sources and methodologies used for measuring progress in establishing democratic societies, improving political systems, fighting corruption, enforcing rule of law, etc. Delegates suggested that the quality of the report could be enhanced by using more recent, accurate and recognized data for analysis and comparisons, establishing a unified system of indicators of assessment of countries' development, and by improving communication with the relevant institutions in countries and competent international organizations to ensure data quality and reliability, rather than using NGO or private foundations sources. The secretariat responded by saying that the latest available data is used for the Survey. Official data is preferred if available and when this is not the case, data from other sources is carefully scrutinized. Member countries are welcome to provide more recent data if available.

22. The question of whether it would be possible to analyse potential rate of growth was also raised.

23. The secretariat added that it would be interesting to estimate growth potential, but the necessary data time series are not currently available.

Sustainable development in the UNECE region (Agenda item 3)

National sustainable development strategies: Main problems, lessons and implications for the work of the UNECE

24. The discussion on this item was organized around two Round Tables as follows:

(i) Round Table I: "Progress in national strategies for sustainable development". Mr. Ioan Jelev, State Secretary for Environmental Protection, Ministry of Water and Environmental Protection, Romania, acted as moderator. The following persons participated as panellists: Mr. Christian Vanden Bilcke, Director, Directorate for Sustainable Development and Science Cooperation, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Belgium; Mr. Amir Hadziomeragic, Economic Development Unit, Ministry of Foreign Trade and Economic Relations, Bosnia and Herzegovina; Mr. Tomas Novotny, Deputy Minister for the Environment, Czech Republic; Ms. Kairi Saar, External Economic Policy Department, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Estonia; Mrs. Cornelia Quennet-Thielen, Deputy Director General, Federal Ministry for the Environment, Nature Conservation and Nuclear Safety; Germany; Mrs. Judit Habuda, Assistant State Secretary from the Office of the Prime Minister, Hungary; Mr. Veaceslav Afanasiev, Deputy-Minister of Economy, Republic of Moldova; Mr. Jószef Berenyi, State Secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Slovakia; and Mr. Pierre Alain Rumley, Directeur de l'Office Fédéral du Développement Territorial, Switzerland.

(ii) Round Table II: "Strategy Implementation / The role of International Cooperation". Mr. Andrey Granovsky, Director, Department of International Organizations, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Russian Federation, moderated the session. The following persons participated as panellists: Mr. Manfred Schneider, Director for International Environment Affairs, Federal Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry, Environment and Water Management, Austria; H.E. Mr. Mahmud Mamed-Kuliyev, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs, Azerbaijan; Mr. Rupert Willis, Directorate General for Environment, European Commission; Mr. Kari Karanko, Director for International Environmental Policy, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Finland; Mr. Marc Giacomini, Chef du Service des Affaires Internationales du Ministère de l'Ecologie et du Développement Durable, France; Ms. Vicky Karagiorgou, Special Advisor of the Ministry of Environment, Urban Planning and Public Works, Greece; Mr. Jacek Jaskiewicz, Counsellor to the Minister, Ministry of Environment, Poland; Mr. Igor Shumylo, First Deputy State Secretary, Ministry of Economy and European Integration, Ukraine.

25. During the first Round Table, the panellists presented their experience in the development of the national plans/strategies for sustainable development in their countries and the progress made thereof. The presentations were made around the four main questions of interest, namely, what are the priorities that received particular attention in the national sustainable development strategy; what are the main stages in the process of developing the strategy; including the role of major stakeholders; what are the major policies and tools envisaged; and how are the necessary resources estimated and ensured.

26. While many UNECE member countries have already adopted a national strategy/ plan for sustainable development, others are still in the process of finalizing their plans. Many developed

their plans on sustainable development in parallel with, or in the broad framework of, the national development plan. The challenge is to ensure the coordination and coherence between the two.

27. Based on these presentations, the following points emerged as of key importance to the development of national sustainable development strategies:

- (i) It is advisable not to try to comprehensively tackle all issues raised by Agenda 21 but to limit action to carefully selected areas of concern;
- (ii) The selection of these concerns must come through a process of consultation with all stakeholders, including local governments, local communities, the broader civil society, academics, NGOs. The role of partnerships was emphasized;
- (iii) Efforts must be made to ensure that all three pillars of sustainable development are addressed and on an equal footing;
- (iv) Among the priorities or areas commonly addressed by the countries are the following: decoupling economic growth from environmental degradation; changing production and consumption patterns; science and technology development; fighting poverty and ensuring social cohesion; improving quality of life and well being of the people; health; sound management of natural resources; sustainable energy policy; environmental protection; research, technology and innovations; land use, urban planning and development; environment-friendly mobility;
- (v) The process and the plan need to be supported by a legislative framework and a commitment from the highest level of the government;
- (vi) In the experience of several countries, the establishment of an appropriate institutional framework is necessary, such as the creation of interministerial committees and national councils for the purpose of developing and subsequent refining of the national strategy has proved to be essential; such mechanisms would allow for priority setting that results from the involvement of government at all levels, as well as all stakeholders (local authorities, NGOs, scientific circles, private sector), thus leading to a feeling of ownership;
- (vii) The establishment of sustainable development focal points in each government department and related organization is also felt to be a useful means of ensuring multidisciplinary involvement, and contact point and follow-up;
- (viii) The national sustainable development plan should be a living document, with reviews and monitoring mechanisms put in place; its development and implementation should be a continual learning process;
- (ix) Progress in implementation should be measured through the use of concrete indicators, with clearly identified targets and a set timetable.

28. Many countries make use of the Internet as a tool to facilitate public consultations, making information available to the public and receiving feedback from all parts of civil society. In this connection, it was also suggested that UNECE place on its website the reports on progress in development and implementation of national sustainable development plans/ strategies of its member countries.

29. It was also suggested that UNECE could provide a framework of evaluation; support capacity building for monitoring progress and impact assessment; exchange experiences on how to prioritize and ensure linkages with global programmes and national plans.

30. The second panel focussed on Strategy Implementation and the role of international cooperation.

31. The contribution of the panellists focussed on five questions: (a) Is there an implementation/action plan for the strategy; (b) how are specific implementation measures developed, agreed upon, implemented and evaluated; (c) have national indicators for sustainable development been developed and used; (d) are there any specific challenges or difficulties in the development or implementation of the strategy for which the country would like to seek assistance and learn from the experience of other countries; (e) are there any achievements, good examples or lessons learned that might be useful to other countries, and what is the added value of international/regional cooperation from your point of view.

- 32. On the basis of the panel discussion, the following could be highlighted:
- (i) Several panellists indicated that they revise their National Sustainable Development Strategies on a regular basis according to the progress made;
- (ii) Given the need to match the long-term objectives with short-term political interests, highlevel political support is necessary for successful implementation;
- (iii) Some panellists reported on the implementation mechanisms established at the national level combining all relevant Ministerial Departments and different stakeholders. It was mentioned that broad partnerships and dialogue are necessary for successful implementation and help to create a sense of ownership in different stakeholder groups;
- (iv) The need to review progress in strategy implementation on the basis of specific targets, indicators and timetables was highlighted. Some panellists reported the need for developing sustainable development indicators and databases and international institutions, including the United Nations, could play a role here. There is a need for peer reviews based on reliable statistical indicators;
- (v) Some panellists suggested that there is a need to treat all dimensions of sustainable development in an integrated manner, including cultural, employment, ageing and other dimensions;
- (vi) The importance of subregional and regional cooperation was highlighted, such as the Euro-Mediterranean and Baltic Sea partnership initiatives;
- (vii) It was suggested that United Nations institutions should support follow-up to the Johannesburg Summit at country level;
- (viii) The international governance on sustainable development was underlined as an important issue, taking into account cultural diversity, global public goals, the social dimension of globalization, inclusion of the environmental dimension in the multilateral trade

negotiations. A suggestion for a possible future world environmental organization was recalled.

33. The panellists suggested the following possible roles for UNECE to be considered by the Commission:

- (i) UNECE to stimulate, support, enhance or build on subregional processes;
- (ii) Reflection and exchange of best practices on mechanisms and tools for shaping long term policy decisions and ensuring a balanced integration of the three dimensions of sustainable development into all sectors of activities;
- (iii) Place for developing a set of interrelated indicators on sustainable development, for providing a solid statistical basis for supporting national follow-up.

34. The Moderator suggested two additional issues that need consideration, namely financing for sustainable development at the national level, and capacity building and education.

• Regional perspectives on sustainable development: the UNECE's follow-up to the World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD)

35. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of a formal document "Proposed Follow-up for the UNECE Region of the World Summit on Sustainable Development" (E/ECE/1398).

36. The document was introduced by the Executive Secretary. Remarks were made by Ms. Anne Kerr, the Chief of the National Information Strategies and Institutions Branch of the secretariat for the Commission for Sustainable Development (CSD) in New York, who noted that the real success of the World Summit on Sustainable Development would be measured by whether the challenge of turning the goals and commitments into reality will be met.

37. Ms. Kerr reported that the Secretary-General had recently released a report on "Follow-up to Johannesburg and the Future Role of the CSD: the Implementation Track", which emphasized the dynamic and catalytic roles that the regions can play in enhancing the linkages between global deliberations and national implementation and in involving other regional institutions in sustainable development work. The subject of regional implementation forums will be on the agenda of the high-level Ministerial segment of CSD-11 in April 2003.

38. A number of points were made during the discussion, including:

• The WSSD gave a clear mandate to the United Nations regional commissions in its "Plan of Implementation";

• UNECE had already done important work in the area of sustainable development even before WSSD. The follow-up should build upon UNECE's well-developed activities and the expertise already available in the field of sustainable development should be fully utilized.

- Delegations expressed appreciation of the efforts of the UNECE secretariat aimed at mainstreaming sustainable development within the different subprogrammes. It was mentioned that the areas in which UNECE is active all have importance in relation to sustainable development. All activities should be scrutinized with a view to ensuring that they are supportive of sustainable development.
- The need for the UNECE to elaborate an action-oriented strategy on Education for Sustainable Development, together with the Council of Europe and UNESCO;
- Any new activity should have a clear added value to what other organizations are doing in this field and any new work area should be driven by the demand of member States. There is a need to avoid duplication with other United Nations bodies, such as WHO, UNEP and UNESCO, and to cooperate with them.
- UNECE activities should be coherent with ongoing programmes and processes, such as the sustainable development activities carried out in the framework of CSD, UNEP and the "Environment for Europe" process. It is advisable for UNECE to pursue coordinated approaches with other regional organizations and sub-regional processes.
- UNECE should play an active role in the implementation of the sustainable development strategies, in reviewing the national sustainable development programmes, reviewing Johannesburg partnerships and creating new partnerships.

39. In response to a question regarding the working format of the Senior Management Group, the secretariat stated that while the Group was a structure created within the secretariat to facilitate inter-divisional cooperation, consultations with member States could be organized on substantive issues.

40. Following the discussion, during which divergent views were expressed, the Commission agreed in general with a role for UNECE in follow-up to WSSD on the understanding that the specific format and modalities will be decided following the debate and possible decisions by the CSD and at an Ad Hoc Informal Meeting of the Commission.

The UNECE reform (Agenda item 4)

41. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of the document "The UNECE Reform" (E/ECE/1399) which focused on the reform of the secretariat, the intergovernmental structure, and the reform of technical cooperation.

42. The Executive Secretary, in introducing the document, recalled that the discussion on the UNECE reform had started at the fifty-seventh Annual Session of the Commission in May 2002 on the basis of Conference Room Paper 3 on "Strengthening the Organization – UNECE's Secretariat's Self-Assessment".

43. Points made by delegations included the following:

- The need to enhance the role of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (GEPW) as a forum and the platform for member States for consultations and formulation of recommendations for action by the Commission;
- The role of the Steering Group needed to be reconsidered;
- The necessity to coordinate with member States and their permanent missions on invitations to participate in UNECE meetings;
- In addition, the need to improve procedures used by UNECE and by the United Nations Office at Geneva for registration and admission to the Palais des Nations, so as to improve security.
- The 1997 Plan of Action is still valid and should guide the work of UNECE;
- UNECE Reform should be a continuous process and be part of the broader United Nations Reform;
- Continued and regular review of the intergovernmental structure should be carried out with the full participation of Principal Subsidiary Bodies and their subsidiary bodies;
- Sunset clauses should be introduced when appropriate;
- The intergovernmental structure should reflect UNECE's mandate, meet the main priorities of the Commission and be flexible enough to respond to new challenges;
- The set of the proposals in the Reform document need explicit timetables in order to enhance transparency and accountability;
- The views of experts familiar with the overall United Nations reform process (e.g. from UNHQ) should be brought to bear on the UNECE reform exercise;
- The frequency of meetings and number of reports produced should be reviewed for efficiency and relevance;
- Programme and project evaluation and monitoring by external experts and member States_should provide useful information and improve planning and targeting of activities;
- There is a need for streamlining and avoiding duplication in all activities;
- Intersectoral activities should be further strengthened;
- Technical cooperation should be demand driven and result oriented and focus on main priority areas and on the countries most in need;
- Greater transparency and accountability to member States is needed in regard to technical cooperation, including the activities of the Regional Advisors;

- Need to improve the coherence of the internal structures within UNECE;
- Fund-raising for technical cooperation needs to be enhanced and appropriate strategy developed;
- Priority setting for, and planning of, technical cooperation should be improved and member States need to be closely involved in decision-making on this issue;
- Improved qualitative assessment of the results of technical cooperation is crucial.

44. In his concluding remarks, the Chairman of the Commission stated that many delegations had welcomed the direction of the Executive Secretary's paper and had had positive reactions to some of the actions included therein. Others, however, required further discussion, in particular Action 3 regarding intergovernmental restructuring and those relating to the intergovernmental structure and to technical cooperation. It was therefore reaffirmed that the GEPW would continue deliberations on the reform of the UNECE, including the points made by delegations set out in paragraph 43 above, as part of its work programme and provide recommendations to be considered by the Commission.

Major policy directions of UNECE's work (Agenda item 5)

45. The Commission considered this item on the basis of the paper by the Executive Secretary on "Major Policy directions of UNECE's work" (E/ECE/1400).

- 46. The following points emerged from the discussion:
 - The Commission expressed its general agreement on the content of the paper.
 - The Commission supported the continuation of the current UNECE approach to mainstream the three dimensions of sustainable development into all UNECE areas of work as a way to further integrate sustainable development concerns into its activities, in response to the WSSD Plan of Implementation.
 - While UNECE needs to be responsive to new developments by making adjustments to its work programme as necessary and appropriate, its mandate did not need to be extended. Rather, UNECE should continue to focus its work in areas where it has recognized expertise and proven advantages. Adjustments should not adversely affect its well-established work, particularly in standard setting. Activities should be demand-driven.
 - New activities should be introduced through adjustment of the work programme in a way that does not require additional budgetary resources.
 - With regard to post-enlargement Europe, UNECE should continue to play its role in supporting regional cooperation between the EU and the non-acceding countries and among non-acceding countries. This work should contribute to creating favourable

conditions for increased economic cooperation in Europe. Technical cooperation should focus on the adjustment of transition economies of non-acceding countries. At the same time, overlap with various EU assistance programmes should be avoided. In regard to the implementation of norms, it was felt useful to strengthen UNECE's cooperation with the European Commission.

- The importance of information and communication technologies (ICT) and knowledgebased economy was recognized for transition economies in particular although the scope of future work in these areas still needed to be further defined while maintaining the balance with the principal body, the International Telecommunication Union (ITU).
- Work in the area of corporate governance was questioned. Care would be needed in defining the work in order to bring maximum benefits to member countries, while avoiding duplication with other organizations working in this field.
- The focus on implementation was endorsed.
- The role of UNECE in assisting countries in monitoring and assessment of progress in implementing objectives of those global conferences relevant to the UNECE mandate was underlined.

UNECE's achievements and constraints during 2002 and perspectives for 2003

(Agenda item 6)

47. The discussion under this item took place on the basis of the report by the Executive Secretary on "UNECE's achievements and constraints during 2002 and perspectives for 2003" (E/ECE/1401).

48. The chairpersons / vice-chairpersons of UNECE Principal Subsidiary Bodies (PSBs) made presentations that highlighted the results of their work and the outlook and challenges ahead.

49. The Commission expressed its satisfaction of the work of the PSBs. The following points were also underlined:

- All PSBs already regularly review their strategic directions and review their priorities and activities. However, some future streamlining and restructuring of the subsidiary bodies and related groups need also to be considered, to ensure their continued relevance and effectiveness
- Decision-making by the Commission would be assisted by evaluations of the effectiveness and impact of UNECE's work
- Gender issues need to be further incorporated into the work of all subprogrammes
- The role of the PSB Bureaux in overall programme coordination with the other organizations involved in the same fields of activities was underlined, in order to avoid duplication and strengthen complementarity of work.

50. Clarifications to various questions were provided. The Chairman concluded by reiterating the usefulness of having included this item in the agenda and stressing the importance of the "real" work done by the PSBs.

Preparation for and follow-up to World and Regional Conferences

- Information on the holding of the Pan-European Regional Ministerial Conference (Bucharest, November 2002) in preparation for the World Summit on Information Society and Preparations for the World Summit on Information Society in December 2003
- Follow-up to the Ministerial Conference on Ageing in Berlin, September 2002 (Agenda item 7)

51. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of the document "Preparation for and Follow-up to World and Regional Conferences" (E/ECE/1402), which provided information on the Pan-European Regional Ministerial Conference held in preparation for the World Summit on Information Society and proposals for UNECE follow-up to the Ministerial Conference on Ageing.

52. The delegations of Romania and Germany made introductory remarks concerning the Pan-European Regional Ministerial Conference and the Ministerial Conference on Ageing respectively.

53. A number of points were made during the discussion, including:

- Satisfaction was expressed with both the preparatory process and the outcome of the Pan-European Regional Ministerial Conference and its impact on the preparations for the WSIS;
- Participation in the follow-up to Berlin should be within UNECE's existing mandate and resources and draw on UNECE's recognized expertise, however without establishing a new separate area of programme activities;
- Follow-up should be properly structured and focus on mainstreaming of ageing policy into existing structures and programme of work;
- Coordination with other relevant organizations should be ensured;
- In regard to follow-up to Berlin, UNECE should play an active role in networking, facilitating information exchange, through seminars and round tables and collecting data and preparing analysis, while avoiding duplication with the activities of other organizations;
- The proposed cooperation with the European Centre for Social Welfare Policy and Research in Vienna was welcomed.

54. In summing up the discussion, the Chair recognized overall appreciation of delegations of the input of UNECE into the work of the two conferences. He noted that in regard to the follow-

up to the Ministerial Conference on Ageing, it is work in progress that needs further discussion with member States, staying within the mandate and expertise of UNECE.

Technical cooperation (Agenda item 8)

55. For the consideration of this item, the Commission had before it document E/ECE/1403 on "UNECE technical cooperation activities in 2002: An overview".

56. The Commission gave a positive assessment of the work done by UNECE in technical cooperation and providing assistance to its less advanced member countries. It welcomed the formation of a new Technical Cooperation Unit and supported the idea of setting up a joint committee in the secretariat to improve the overall coordination of technical cooperation activities.

- 57. The following points were underlined:
 - The priority setting mechanism for technical cooperation activities needed to be strengthened to ensure that technical assistance projects are carried out in response to real needs of member countries and that they do not overlap with the work of other organizations;
 - Technical cooperation activities should be demand-driven and action oriented, with emphasis given to less advanced, low-income countries with economies in transition;
 - Technical cooperation activities in relation to South Caucasus as well as to Central Asia, in the framework of the Special Programme for Economies of Central Asia (SPECA), should be strengthened;
 - The secretariat needs to find new ways for fund raising; possibly through better channelling of information to potential donors, including by sending information on project proposals to missions in Geneva and inviting financial support from donor governments as well as from the private sector;
 - Regular provision of information on ongoing technical assistance projects would contribute to improving transparency. In this respect, member States were informed of a new UNECE website on technical cooperation where information on trust funds and project proposals is made available.
 - Financial assistance should be made available to low-income countries with economies in transition to enable them to participate in UNECE activities such as workshops and seminars;
 - Evaluation of technical cooperation activities, though recognized as being difficult and complex and requiring resources, is important and necessary;
 - Any increase in technical cooperation activities should not draw resources away from the core activities of UNECE, in particular the standard setting work.

Cooperation and coordination with other organizations (Agenda item 9)

58. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of the document "Cooperation and Coordination with Other Organizations" (E/ECE/1404). It expressed its satisfaction with the way UNECE cooperates with other organizations active in the same area of work and encouraged the secretariat to further strengthen this cooperation.

- 59. During the discussion, the following points were made:
 - The substantive contribution of UNECE to OSCE work on the economic and environmental dimensions of security in Europe proved to be very valuable, particularly as it relates to the OSCE annual economic forum, and future contribution to the elaboration of the New Strategy Document as mandated by the OSCE Ministerial Conference in Porto (December 2002);
 - The role of UNECE in the work with OSCE had not been recognized enough in the past;
 - Reference to the role of UNECE in the work with OSCE should be made in the UNECE programme of work in the future;
 - Possibility of budget allocation was suggested for consideration;
 - The potential of UNECE cooperation with sub-regional organizations, in particular in the "eastern part" of the UNECE region, should be further explored.

Report of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (GEPW) (Agenda item 10)

60. The Commission had before it the report of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (E/ECE/1405) containing a summary of the work carried out by the Group during 2002. The Chairperson of the Group further informed the Commission of the formal and informal meetings of the Group that took place at the beginning of 2003.

61. Appreciation was expressed by many delegations for the extensive work of the Group on many issues and member States reiterated the need to enhance the role of the GEPW.

62. The Chairman welcomed the interest of member States and reaffirmed that the Commission had on many occasions mandated the Group to address various issues and make recommendations to the Commission. The strengthening of the Group's mandate should be taken up by member States in the course of the year, within the framework of the ongoing discussion on the UNECE reform.

63. The Commission thanked Ms Irina Ananich (Belarus) for her contribution as Chairperson of the GEPW and expressed its best wishes for her future diplomatic career.

Other business

(Agenda item 12)

64. Under this item delegations raised the problem of the timely issuance of official documentation in the three working languages of the Commission, including on the official UNECE website, as recommended by the Ad Hoc Informal Meeting on 2 December 2002.

Adoption of the Annual Report of the Commission

(Agenda item 13)

65. At its sixth meeting, on 6 March 2003, the Commission adopted its report covering the period from 11 May 2002 to 6 March 2003.
