1. SUMMARY OF ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE

EA1: Enhanced national capacities of the selected countries of South-East Europe to assess the most critical aspects and priority needs in their environmental governance and policies.

In support of expected accomplishment EA.1: the reviews of implementation of the implementation of the recommendations coming from EPRs vis-à-vis SDGs and targets were completed for Albania, Montenegro, North Macedonia and Serbia (Activity 1.1); needs assessments were completed and validated by Montenegro, North Macedonia and Serbia, while the needs assessment, although completed, for Albania has yet to be validated by the country (Activity A1.2); and, under Activity A1.3, one validation workshop for the review and needs assessment was organized in Budva, Montenegro, in cooperation with the Ministry of Tourism and Sustainable Development of Montenegro, which covered expenditures related to renting premises and coffee break (http://www.unece.org/index.php?id=51890).

EA 2: Increased national capacities of the selected countries of South-East Europe to develop and integrate evidence-based coherent environmental policies into sector-specific and cross-sectoral strategies aimed at contributing to the achievement of relevant SDGs and 2030 Agenda.

In support of expected accomplishment EA.1: under Activity A2.1, three countries, namely Montenegro, North Macedonia and Serbia, developed programmes or action plans:

Montenegro opted for the Policy package: Health, air quality and energy, which is one of the
policy packages proposed by the needs assessment report. The focus of the policy package is
on air quality management policy. Precisely, Montenegro worked on drafting the air pollution
control programme in line with Gothenburg Protocol to Air Convention and the EU Directive
2016/2284 on the reduction of national emissions of certain atmospheric pollutants. An

integral part of the Programme is a thorough economic analysis of proposed measures s, performed in order to assess the country's financial capability for achievement of emission reductions level, which will be further negotiated with EU and Air Convention Secretariat. The key measures are related to energy efficiency in sectors of housing and transport, while expected results should bring improvement in the health sector, reducing negative impact of air pollution to public health and assisting the country in achievement of SDG targets 3.9 and 11.6.

- North Macedonia: decided to develop a programme of measures for improving the processes of approval of plans for inspection supervision and ad hoc inspection, paying special attention to development of a new law on inspection surveillance in environment, in line with to the provisions of the 2019 Law on inspection surveillance is currently developed. The programme will contribute effectively to achieving SDGs and also contribute to reducing the health-related to environment by improving well-being, as well as strengthening of environmental institutional capacity, with special attention to inspection capacity. The measures will also contribute to the successful implementation of existing laws, considering measures applicable to all relevant sectors, as well as building the national capacities to assess priority needs in environmental governance and facilitating the national action to integrate evidence-based environmental policies. The general aim of this programme is to protect human health
- **Serbia:** Serbia opted for a policy package on circular and green economy. Serbia recognises green economy as an efficient tool for achieving sustainability and Serbia is dedicated to achieving SDGs through implementation of circular and green economy.

Context: Environmental competences are mostly in the entities (Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina and Republika Srpska) and Brčko District. However, competencies related to international environmental agreements and processes are managed at the State level. The country nominated four national focal points: one for each entity (2), one for Brčko District and one at the state level. This setting requires more logistics, since a date to start activities has to be agreed by four national focal points and ECE.	An agreement was reached with the Assistant Minister at the State level to start activities related to A1.1 and A1.2 in spring 2020.		

- 1. Reestablishing contacts with Albania to draft a policy package and with Bosnia and Herzegovina to draft a review of the implementation of the recommendations coming from EPRs vis-à-vis SDGs and targets, need assessments to determine and address gaps identified in the reviews between current conditions and desired achievements of relevant SDGs and eventually a policy package.
- 2. Organized 4 national workshops (Albania, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Serbia) to present and validate the results of the reviews and needs assessments in support of activity a1.3 and 4 national workshops (same countries) to review the respective national action plans/policy packages with inter-ministerial coordination groups and relevant stakeholders and discuss their implementation in support of activity A2.2.

The measures cited above will make it possible to reach the requested implementation rate of about 60% by the end of 2020.
