Multi-pollutant Protocol to enter into force

Portugal has just become the 16th country to ratify the Protocol to Abate Acidification, Eutro-

phication and Ground-level Ozone to the Convention on Long-range Transboundary Air Pollution. The Protocol, originally adopted in 1999 in Gothenburg (Sweden), will thus enter into force on 17 May 2005.

As well as seeking to prevent several environmental effects from air pollutants, the Gothenburg Protocol

sets emission ceilings and controls measures for emissions of sulphur, nitrogen oxides, ammonia and volatile organic compounds. The Parties to the Protocol will hold their first meeting at the time of the next session of the Convention's Executive Body in December 2005. At this meeting they are expected to initiate a first review in keeping with Article 10 of the Protocol.

UNECE good practices to be used in Africa

The UNECE Working Party on Regulatory Cooperation and Standardization Policies (WP6) was invited to present its activities and projects at the Workshop on standardization and poverty alleviation and at the General Assembly of ARSO (African Regional Organization for Standardization), held in Accra, Ghana on 23-25 February 2005.

Delegates were particularly interested in the regulatory approaches and mechanisms proposed in the UNECE Recommendation "L" (International Model for Technical Harmonization) and in the format provided by the UNECE Regulatory and Standardization List for initiating a convergence

dialogue between regulators and standardizers through the identification of national priorities.

During the meeting, the UNECE secretariat was requested to consider ways that it could contribute to capacity building in ARSO for

African standards-setting bodies in areas where UNECE legal instruments have global applications. In the coming months the UNECE will be discussing this request with its counterpart, the Economic Commission for Africa, and interested donors.

follows the ReportNet system of the European Environment Agency and aims to ensure access online to the publications and reports on such issues as environmental pollution, climate change, biodiversity, forests, land resources and soils, water, environmental health...
