

Revision of Standard Layout

- Amendments agreed:
 - Standards can be applied at all levels of distribution
 - pest damage affecting the flesh being part of minimum requirements, while pest damage affecting the skin only will be covered by the skin defects
 - tolerances elaborated to better address occasional the odd unit that is more seriously affected than allowed for the Class
 - introduction of master text for provisions on mixtures of varieties, commercial types and/or colours (introduction to the standards to be decided on the product basis)
- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008







Early and Ware Potatoes (FFV-52)

- ✓ Working group meeting in Paris, April 2008
 - No agreement on introducing (optional) classification
- Proposals of the OECD working group related to the explanatory brochure on early and ware potatoes were supported by EUROPATAT
- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - "must be free from cracks exceeding 4 mm in depth"
 - must be free from frost damage and freezing injuries
 - •"Ware potatoes must be covered with well-formed skin; i.e. skin has to be fully developed and mature and must cover the whole tuber"
- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008
- ✓ OECD explanatory brochure in preparation







Apples (FFV-50)

- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - provisions on uniformity in size when sized by weight updated to better reflect the grading process to and to better guarantee uniformity
- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008
- ✓ OECD explanatory brochure in preparation



Pears (FFV-51)

- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - alignment to the standard layout
 - bruises allowed in Classes I and II
 - no reference to discoloration of the flesh
 - 1 cm² bruise in Class I
 - 2 cm² bruise in Class II
 - mixtures of varieties allowed, provided the varieties are distinctly different, of uniform quality and – for the variety concerned – uniform in origin
- Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008

Lettuces, curled-leaved endives & broad-leaved endives (FFV-22)

- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - lettuces with root balls are excluded from the standard



- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008

Avocados (FFV-42)

- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - minimum weight reduced from 125 g to 123 g (exception for variety Hass: 80 g)
 - size scale adjusted to practice
- Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008

Tomatoes (FFV-36)

- ✓ Amendments agreed:
 - alignment to the standard layout
 - Aufhebung of the minimum size
 - simplification of provisions for uniformity in size
 - alternative table with fixed size codes available (optional)
 - mixtures of commercial types or colours allowed, provided these are distinctly different, of uniform quality and – for the type or colour concerned – uniform in origin
- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008

Cucumbers (FFV-15)

- ✓Amendments agreed:
 - alignment to the standard layout
 - specification of defects allowed in Classes I and II in accordance with trade praxis
 - Aufhebung of the minimum size
 - simplification of provisions for uniformity in size
- Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008
- ✓ OECD explanatory brochure published in 2008 based on the 2008 version of the Standard www.oecdbookshop.org (electronic version free of charge)







Apricots (FFV-02)

- ✓Amendments agreed:
 - alignment to the standard layout
 - specification of defects allowed in Classes I and II in accordance with trade praxis
- Under discussion
 - simplification of provisions concerning sizing
- ✓ Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008 as recommendation for a one year trial period
- ✓ OECD explanatory brochure in preparation








Peaches and Nectarines (FFV-26)

- ✓Amendments agreed:
 - alignment to the standard layout
 - introduction of minimum Brix level to guarantee satisfactory development and ripeness
 - specification of defects allowed in Classes I and II in accordance with trade praxis
- Under discussion
 - simplification of provisions concerning sizing
- Amendments approved by Working Party in November 2008 as recommendation for a one year trial period
- ✓OECD explanatory brochure in preparation



Future Work on Standards for

- Apples (uniformity in size by diameter, list of varieties, colour)
- Apricots (recommendation)
- Avocados (sizing Antillean varieties)
- Citrus fruit (proposals by OECD working group)
- √ Chanterelles (new standard)



- Fresh chilli peppers (new standard)
- Lettuces (integration of lettuce with root balls or pods)
- Peaches and nectarines (recommendation)
- ✓ Pears (colouring)
- Sweet peppers (revision, explanatory brochure)
- ✓ Witloof chicory (alignment to trade praxis)
- ✓ other standards on request







Cooperation with other International Standardisation Bodies

- ✓ development of explanatory material based on UN-Standards
- ✓ co-operation in capacity building activities
- ✓ task forces of both organisations explore the possibility and necessity to concentrate the activities as regards standard setting and development of explanatory material at the UNECE

Joint FAO/WHO Food Standards Program

√ harmonisation of standards if both organisation have a standard for the same produce
