

- Programmatic work fostering inclusive economic transformation
- Two recent projects on standards and sustainable development:
 - Private Sustainability Standards, Trade and Sustainable Development (2017):

 - Gender, Standards and Trade (2018): 3 papers

ICTSD's Ongoing Work on Gender, Standards and Trade

- Research part of ICTSD project "New Thinking on Trade and Gender"
- Funded by Department of Foreign Affairs of Australia
- Current research on standards, gender and trade:
 - SPS, gender and trade
 - Voluntary sustainability standards, gender and trade
 - Standards, gender and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
- Being consolidated into a background paper on gender, standards and trade for WTO/WB Global Report on Trade and Gender
- Complemented by regional engagement (dialogues, dissemination)



Standards Impact on Women as Producers (1)

- High costs of compliance
- Difficulty accessing resources for compliance (e.g. information, finance)
- May lack skills required to benefit from standards (e.g. literacy, numeracy)
- Risk of exclusion from standard-governed global value chains (GVCs), or
- Changes in women's position in GVCs

Standards Impact on Women as Producers (2)

- Adoption may improve women's access to land, credit, technology
- Positive effects on health, safety, education
- Increase in workload disproportionately affects women
- Some positive impacts on hired labour
- Opportunities for ongoing upgrading in GVCs to improve livelihoods



Standards Impact on Women as Consumers, Caregivers, and Citizens

- As consumers:
 - safety of food, cosmetics, medicines, cars, bikes
- As mothers, wives and caregivers:
 - some VSS provide for childcare
 - Some evidence of reduced domestic violence
 - Improved household dynamics, inc. increase female decision-making
- As citizens:
 - Membership in producer organizations boosts voice, collective action
 - Can facilitate power over production management decisions

Insights from ICTSD research on Gender, Standards and Trade

- ➤ Standards have gendered impacts
- ➤ Need women's voices in standards setting, documents & organization
- ➤ Gender-sensitive technical assistance and measurement can boost progress towards SDG5
- Trade policy-makers can help through gender-sensitive SPS, TBT, government procurement rules
- ➤ Options for mainstreaming gender in standard-setting organizations
