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Information needed to determine the scope of SEA: Scoping Report

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Purpose of scoping

Scoping shall identify development interventions and relevant **environmental and health issues**, which should be further considered within the SEA

Scoping can also identify, as far as possible:

- territorial scope of the assessment and key areas of concern,
- stakeholders to be involved,
- data and information to be considered









Typical sections of the scoping report

Key components:

- Information about the plan/programme under preparation, including the indication of territory of application
- Outline of the state of the environment (public health) in the potentially affected territory and existing environmental (human health) problems
- Identification of environmental/health issues that can be affected by the implementation of the plan/programme











Typical sections of the scoping report

Additional useful aspects:

- Identification of other relevant strategies and policy goals
- Identification of key stakeholders
- Indication of approach to assessment, methods, or specific analyses to be conducted at the later stage of SEA
- Preliminary proposals to be considered by planners
- Acknowledged data gaps and lack of information
- Possible alternatives or options which should be addressed within SEA and/or plan or programme

CHAPTER 1: INTRODUCTION

CHAPTER 2: INTRODUCTION TO THE WASTE MANAGEMENT STRATEGY AND ACTION PLAN

This section provides information about the nature of the concerned strategic document as anticipated by the draft Environmenal Assessment Code

- Article 25, paragraph 3
 - a) information about the planning authority;
 - b) a brief description of strategic document,
 - f) the aims and nature of proposed strategic document, and possible alternatives;
 - g) the degree to which the strategic document sets a framework for projects and other activities, either with regard to location, nature, size and operating conditions or by allocating natural resources.

CHAPTER 3: PRELIMINARY BASELINE ANALYSIS









CHAPTER 4: PRELIMINARY POLICY ANALYSIS

This section identifies key strategic documents and environmental policy objectives forming a planning context for the preparation of the concerned strategic document as anticipated by the draft Environmental Assessment Code

- Article 25, paragraph 3
 - i) its relation to other existing or planned strategic documents;

CHAPTER 5: KEY ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

- Article 25, paragraph 3
 - c) information on the scale of possible environmental impact on the environment and public health;
 - d) information on possible impact and scale on the protected areas;
 - and paragraph 4
 - h) the types of environmental impacts to be examined and reported;











CHAPTER 6: POTENTIAL TRANSBOUNDARY IMPACTS

This section provides information about the potential for transboundary environmental effects of the concerned strategic document as anticipated by the draft Environmental Assessment Code

- Article 25, paragraph 3
 - e) magnitude of transboundary impact on the environment and public health.

CHAPTER 7: STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS

- Article 25, paragraph 3
 - I) information on those people who might be impacted by strategic document;
 - m) Information on those agencies which can provide comments and views on strategic document within their competence.





CHAPTER 8: INITIAL RECOMMENDATION

This section provides preliminary indication of measures to address potential negative environmental effects of the concerned strategic document as anticipated by the draft Environmental Assessment Code,

- Article 25, paragraph 3:
 - k) information of measures, which should be considered for mitigating, preventing and compensating negative impact in case of implementing strategic document;

CHAPTER 9: GAPS IN INFORMATION AND CHALLENGES

CHAPTER 10: PLANNED APPROACH TO THE EVALUATION OF EFFECTS

Article 25, paragraph 3

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 j) baseline surveys and investigations which should be carried out and methods and criteria to be used for prediction and evaluation of impact;









CHAPTER 11: FUTURE STEPS IN SEA

This section outlines further steps of the SEA process and indicates the content of the SEA Report as anticipated by the draft Environmental Assessment Code









Considerations for practice

- Required content of scoping report is potentially very demanding in terms of analytical work – little left for the main SEA phase (SEA report)
- e.g. Article 25, paragraph 3
 - c) information on the scale of possible environmental impact on the environment and public health;
 - d) information on the <u>scale of possible impact</u> on the protected areas; and paragraph 4
 - f) information of measures, which should be considered for mitigating, preventing and compensating negative impact in case of implementing strategic document;
- What should be the structure of the scoping report in order to comply with the legal requirements while ensuring intelligibility and suitability for SEA workflow (i.e. drafting the SEA report)?
- No explicit requirement for environmental baseline analysis in the Scoping report in the current draft EA Code
