- Procedural elements
 - Scoping document
 - Who participates
 - Who decides
- Scoping determination/decision
 - Form and legal nature

SEA (environmental) report– art. 7

- Requirements in Art. 7 and annex IV
- Key elements
- Specificity of SEA report
 - 5. The environmental, including health, objectives established at international, national and other levels which are relevant to the plan or programme, and the ways in which these objectives and other environmental, including health, considerations have been taken into account during its preparation.
- Streamlining the report following the concept of tiering

SEA report – cd

- Relation to
 - Definition of SEA
 - Definition of SEA Report
- Requirements - Annex IV
 - Mandatory – all items must be included
 - New items may be added
 - Relation to scoping
 - Key elements
 - Environmental objectives
 - Health issues
