Note by the secretariat

Summary

The present report was prepared pursuant to a decision taken by the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol on Pollutant Release and Transfer Registers to the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters at its third session (Budva, Montenegro, 15 September 2017) (ECE/MP.PRTR/2017/6/Add.1, decision III/3, para. 9). It provides an overview of contributions and expenditures in relation to implementation of the 2015–2017 work programme for the Protocol during the period 1 January to 31 December 2017 and of the 2018–2021 work programme for the Protocol as at 23 July 2018.

I. General considerations

1. The present report provides an overview of contributions and expenditures in relation to implementation of the 2015–2017 work programme for the Protocol on Pollutant Release and Transfer Registers (ECE/MP.PRTR/2014/4/Add.1, decision II/4, para. 10) during the period 1 January to 31 December 2017 and of the 2018–2021 work programme for the Protocol (ECE/MP.PRTR/2017/6/Add.1, decision III/3, paragraph 9) as at 23 July 2018.¹ During the reporting period (1 January 2017 to 23 July 2018), the secretariat of the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters (Aarhus Convention) and its Protocol on Pollutant Release and Transfer Registers (Protocol on PRTRs) remained cautious in allocating resources, owing primarily to the fact that since many contributions were not yet available at the beginning of the financial year, there was some uncertainty as to the availability of sufficient funds. The secretariat made various efforts to encourage in-kind contributions in order to reduce the impact on the trust fund, and it will continue to pursue synergies with other United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) multilateral environmental agreements, United Nations agencies and other partners in order to maintain a satisfactory number of activities and to share implementation costs.

2. For the sustainability of the work under the Protocol, it is crucial to ensure staff funding on a long-term basis. The extension of contracts for staff funded under the trust fund depends on the availability and the level of the contributions received. Since the current financial scheme is based on voluntary contributions and provides no guidance regarding their amount, the level of contributions fluctuates, making the funding of extrabudgetary posts unpredictable and far from secure. As in the past, the secretariat was therefore obliged to give priority to securing funds for staff costs, which need to be reserved for at least one year before issuing a staff contract. The secretariat was able to allocate sufficient funds for staff and for activities in the reporting period only owing to savings accumulated at the end of each preceding year.

3. The temporary arrangement whereby one administrative staff post was funded from the 13 per cent programme support costs levied on the ECE Environment Division's trust funds was discontinued as from 1 February 2016. This staff member is required in order to provide support for activities under the Convention and its Protocol, including administrative arrangements for meetings of their governing and subsidiary bodies. In order to ensure uninterrupted implementation, the secretariat recruited an administrative staff member funded through extrabudgetary resources.

II. Contributions

4. The “adjusted contribution” column in Tables 1 and 2 below is intended to offer a more realistic picture of the actual resources available for use in a given year. Contributions by Parties and signatories are often intended for use in a year other than the one in which the funds are deposited and/or received. The adjusted contribution figure for a given year is derived from the actual contribution received during that year, minus any part of the contribution that was intended for use in a different year and plus any contributions made in years other than the reference year but intended for use during that year. Owing to the lack of timely funding for a specific year, the secretariat is obliged to use the available funds as needed. The amounts presented in all tables are rounded to whole numbers.

III. Estimated and projected expenditures

6. The costs shown in tables 4 and 5 below are estimated and projected. The costs are limited to those intended to be covered by voluntary contributions made under the Convention's and Protocol's schemes of financial arrangements through the trust fund. They do not include costs that are expected to be covered under the United Nations regular budget. Figures are rounded up and may change in accordance with United Nations administrative regulations. The expenditures reported are related to implementation of the Protocol's 2015–2017 and 2018–2021 work programmes. Expenses related to the Aarhus Convention are reported to the Convention's bodies.
