DEVELOPMENT OF THE ACTION PLAN







OVERALL GOAL OF THE ACTION PLAN

The forest sector in the ECE region makes the greatest possible contribution to the emerging green economy by improving human well-being and social equity while significantly reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities.

In every aspect of its activities, it minimizes its carbon emissions, uses its resources efficiently and is socially inclusive.





STRATEGIC ISSUES

Uses and reuses wisely **resources**

Contributes to the **mitigation** of climate change

Cares for its workforce

By 2020

Takes all **externalities** into account

Bases decisions on **evidence**

THE FIVE PILLARS OF THE ACTION PLAN

- 1. Sustainable wood consumption and production
- Patterns of consumption and production of forest products are truly sustainable.
- 2. The low-carbon forest sector
- The forest sector makes the best possible contribution to mitigation of, and adaptation to, climate change.

- 3. Decent green jobs in the forest sector
- The workforce is able to implement SFM and the forest sector provides decent jobs.
- 4. Valuation of and payment for forest ecosystem services
- To identify and value forest functions and to establish PES, encouraging sustainable production and consumption patterns.
- 5. Monitoring and governance of the forest sector
- To ensure that the forest sector policies and institutions which promote SFM, that policy making is evidence-based, and policy instruments are effective, efficient and equitable

EXAMPLE:

Decent Green Jobs in the Forest Sector

Strategy for decent green jobs in the forest sector:

- A skilled workforce
- Safety and health of the forestry workforce
- Forest operations
