Chatham House Rule



FORESTS

- **Q.** What are the benefits of using the Rule?
- A. It allows people to speak as individuals, and to express views that may not be those of their organizations, and therefore it encourages free discussion. People usually feel more relaxed if they don't have to worry about their reputation or the implications if they are publicly quoted.

... and how about social media and the press?



- Talk about your own view and opinion ONLY!
- Do not mention what was said by others!
 - Nothing should be done to identify, either explicitly or implicitly, who said what
 - report only what was said at an event and do not identify directly or indirectly the speaker or another participant





Ground rules for the discussion



- No cellphones ringing and recording;
- Statements short and concise;
- Listen to each other do not interrupt;
- Respect each other's opinion; Don't get personal! Don't shout!
- Questions. There are no stupid questions. Questions are triggers for others to share what they know. If there is something you are curious about, pondering, don't understand or what to hear from a peer ask!
- ldeas. Ideas are great things. Sometimes they spark intense conversations and actions. Sometime they fall flat. You never know until you share them. Go for it!
- Challenges. We grow and learn and do our best when people challenge us to do so in supportive ways. That may mean sharing a difference of opinion or experience. That may mean encouraging someone to do better because they can. That may be disagreeing respectfully with their ideas. You can do this in a supportive, comfortable way by prefacing an opinion with 'In my experience...' or '... has worked well for me' or 'I feel like...' which leaves room for others to have different points of view.



FPAMR – forest certification



- ➤ The two major certification schemes the Forest Stewardship Council and the Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification reported a combined global total of 497 million hectares of certified forest in May 2017, a year-on-year increase of 35 million hectares (7.5%).
- ➤ Nearly 69 million hectares are certified under more than one scheme. The total global certified area is estimated at 429 million hectares, a decline of 3 million hectares from the previous reporting period.
- ➤ The majority (85%) of the world's certified forest area is in the UNECE region, with the combined total for Africa, Latin America, Asia and Oceania amounting to only 15%.






FPAMR 2017 – forest certification



Forest area certified by major certification schemes, 2006-2017




Certified forest area by region and certification scheme,

Forest certification – what we <u>don't</u> report on ...



- Share of certified products in the market [globally, regionally, nationally].
- Market value of certified products in the market [globally, regionally, nationally].
- Main forest products certified [by volume and value].
- > Prices for equivalent certified roundwood.
- > Premium received for equivalent certified forest products.
- > Employment created by certification.










- > 275 replies (200 from ECE region);
- Highly educated respondents [>90% with university degree]
- > 73% urban population;
- > 1/3 female, 2/3 male respondents;
- > 90% work on forest related issues;
- 27% of replies from NGOs; government, research and industry 16% of replies each;



- >90% are interested about the origin of wood products & how these have been produced;
- > >85% would like to receive more information about origin and production method;
- > 95% know of at least one certification scheme;
- > 68% seek to buy certified forest products (75% of these respondents would like to have a wider choice, primarily for indoor furniture, food and clothes);
- > >85% would like to see an increase of certified forest area (namely Africa, Asia and Latin America – in descending order)



In the country of respondents ...


- > ... the forest area is ...

Share of forest area certified (as average of responses)










What are the impacts of forest certification globally?

- ➤ Positive (n=176):
 Better management of forest
- Negative (n=146):

> costly	(39.0%)
----------	---------

- unfavorable for smallholders (14.4%)
- greenwashing (13.7%)
- bureaucratic/complex (11.0%)
- > no negative impacts (8.2%)
- multiple certification (4,8%)
