

Why Quality Management?

- Consumer expects good quality and safe food
- Citizen wants clean and healthy environment
- Worker wants safe working conditions
- Entrepreneurs: efficient (inter-)national trade

Increase of law's and regulations

- Public
 - FAO and WHO: Codex Alimentarius, HACCP
 - EU: General Food Law
 - UN-ECE and EU: Marketing Standards
 - FAO, National Government: Maximum Residue levels



Messages for producers

- Spot markets no longer reliable source to secure safety, quality and sustainability
- Small, unaligned, independent growers have to consider their chain strategy
- Realize you can spoil market if you do not comply
- Recalls are very bad for your company\country image
- A pro-active attitude has a positive effect on purchasing behavior of importers and consumers
- Reasons for project Qualiman!!!

Goals project Qualiman

- Identification of bottlenecks and issues in quality management
- Improvement of food safety and product quality
- Training and knowledge exchange



2004/2005: Quick Scan

- Identification of bottlenecks in quality management in the vegetable and/or fruit supply chain
- 10 -20 interviews in Poland, Slovak, Hungary and The Netherlands
- With growers, wholesalers, Product Board, retailers, inspectors, advisors

Bottlenecks product quality

- Lack of knowledge about quality standards EU
- Bad handling fruit and vegetables
 - machinery
 - Personnel
- Lacking storage and sorting capacity



Bottlenecks quality management

- Improving quality demands of supermarkets
- Lack of information about quality management systems (Eurep-GAP, HACCP)
- No awareness / motivation about food safety and quality management
- No guarantee about origin / history product
- Infrastructure for residue analysis, tests, samples



Bottlenecks chain management

- Lack of communication in chain
- Producers have no market orientation and strategy
- Insufficient organization and cooperation in the supply chain
