If the affected party would like to participate, must reply within 30 days. This notification will include available information about the project and detailed information on the consultation process. If the affected party expresses its wish to participate, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs must set up a timetable that guarantees an effective public participation. The affected Party will be contacted again during the consultation and public information phase. Both domestic and transboundary consultations must be analysed in the environmental impact declaration and, when appropriate, established as conditions required to authorise the project.

A very important challenge is how to deal properly with different administrative structures between countries. This adds some complexity to the procedures to be followed. In addition to this, there are often diverse administrative procedures within the Environmental Impact Assessments of countries, which complicates the possibility to jointly carry out some steps as public consultations.

Lessons learned and advice to other Parties: Having bilateral agreements helps to carrying out the procedure of Environmental Impact Assessment, as well as providing the documentation translated into the language of the Affected Party.
