2.POLICIES FOCUSING ON ROAD SAFETY CHALLENGES IN EL SALVADOR





The president of El Salvador, Nayib Bukele, is today the most popular political leader in the continent.

Elected by more than 90% of the population, according to Gallup, and experts consider him a world-class figure.

He came to power on June 1, 2019. That same year, he announced the so-called Territorial Control Plan and declared a prison emergency.

In a second phase, he reinforced the military force and the 2nd of September of that year saw the first day without homicides in the history of this small country.

El Salvador closed 2021 with the safest year in its history.

2.POLICIES FOCUSING ON ROAD SAFETY CHALLENGES IN EL SALVADOR



El Salvador recorded a reduction in all road crashes indicators in 2022 , thanks to the articulated work of the Government, achieving fewer crashes and injured people.

During 2022, there were 17,408 crashes, while in 2021 there were 18,741, i.e., 1,333 less reported according to the National Road Safety Observatory (ONASEVI).

The decrease in road crashes is due to the coordinated work of inspectors and traffic managers of the Vice Ministry of Transportation (VMT), the National Road Safety Council (CONASEVI) and the National Civil Police (PNC), among other entities that ensure road safety education in the country.

2.POLICIES FOCUSING ON ROAD SAFETY CHALLENGES IN EL SALVADOR



Every day, vehicle controls have been installed at the main accesses and exits of the Metropolitan Area of San Salvador (AMSS), among other points, to ensure respect for speed limits; almost 30,000 road users, including drivers and motorcyclists, received road safety education talks, benefiting mainly students from schools located at critical points,

These workshops, included in the National Road Safety Plan, allowed for a greater presence of traffic authorities on the roads, mainly during the Easter, August and year-end hollidays.

During 2022, 22,269 anti-doping tests were carried out, 10% of which took place in December. In these procedures 1,455 drivers were arrested, from January 1 to December 2022.

In 2023, the Government has programmed the installation of 2,800 intelligent traffic lights with it expects a greater control of vehicular traffic, and avoid road crashes.

2.POLICIES FOCUSING ON ROAD SAFETY CHALLENGES IN EL SALVADOR December 24, 2022 VMT Press release

From January 1 to December 23, 2022, there was an 8.72% reduction in traffic crashes originated by dangerous driving, compared to 2021, according to the Vice Ministry of Transportation (VMT).

"We have 8.72% less crashes caused by dangerous drivers (compared to last year), but it is not enough. Remember not to drive under the influence of alcohol"

" On September 3, we had no deaths due to road crashes in our country", confirmed the Vice Minister of Transportation, Saúl Castelar, highlighting one more achievement in the objective of reducing deaths due to road crashes"

The government has pushed through a set of legal reforms necessary for the control of all road space.

Following the UN 30km/h campaign, the first 30km/h zone in the country was established in August in order to provide the population with safe pedestrian areas.

The coverage of signage on the country's roads and streets has been extended, with an emphasis on road crashes hotspots.




