#### **Monitoring implementation**

### A pilot questionnaire for reporting on progress made on the attainment of the Amsterdam Goals

#### Background and mandate

At its eleventh meeting in October 2009, the Bureau of the Steering Committee agreed that monitoring progress made at national level was an important role of the Committee. The Bureau requested the secretariat to develop a pilot questionnaire for Member States in order to determine the level of implementation of THE PEP activities and progress made at the national level in terms of attaining the Amsterdam Goals (ECE/AC.21/SC/2009/8/annex). A draft questionnaire was presented to the Bureau at it s12th meeting and subsequently revised according to comments. A draft of the pilot questionnaire was distributed to the members of the Bureau in advance of the eighth session of the Committee for their comments and feedback during the session, under agenda Item 8 (a).

#### I. The importance of reporting on implementation

- 1. Following the Third High-level Meeting on Transport, Health and Environment in January 2009, the Steering Committee and its Bureau underlined the importance of monitoring the implementation of THE PEP programme and of progress made by Member States toward the attainment of the four Amsterdam Goals. Member States will be offered a limited opportunity to showcase major national achievements in progress towards the Amsterdam Goals. These reports will facilitate the assessment of progress made and provide valuable information about the achievements and obstacles encountered by Member States and other stakeholders in attaining the Amsterdam Goals and in implementing THE PEP.
- 2. The value of the reporting process is not limited to the sharing of information among UNECE-WHO/Europe Member States but would also benefit the implementation process at the national and local level by raising awareness, engaging relevant stakeholders and allowing them to take stock and to identify main successes and challenges.

#### II. Procedures for reporting

- 3. The intention of the reporting process is to assess progress made in the time between the third and fourth high-level meeting on transport, health and environment (i.e. between 2009-2014).
- 4. The Bureau specifically stated that reporting should not be overly burdensome and therefore a simplified process is proposed that allows Member States to report on progress made in the implementation of THE PEP in general, with indicators devoted to each of the four specific Amsterdam Goals and implementation mechanisms.
- 5. The main elements for replying to the questionnaire are as follows:
  - (a) Member States should reply to the questionnaire through a transparent consultative process involving all relevant stakeholders at the national/State level.
  - (b) Questionnaires should be submitted to the secretariat electronically. The text should be in English.
  - (c) Assistance will be available for the preparation and submission of questionnaires. A consolidated progress report will be prepared for the fourth high-level meeting in 2014, highlighting progress made, identifying challenges and drawing up recommendations. These reports will also serve as a regional contribution to the assessment of progress in the implementation of relevant MDGs<sup>2</sup> and other related fora, such as the "Environment for Europe" and "Environment and Health" processes.

#### **III.** Recommendations for the reporting process

- 6. To ensure high-quality answers in the questionnaires, Governments should:
  - Strengthen cross-sectoral and multi-stakeholder participation in preparing replies to the questionnaires in a transparent and participatory manner. One option could be to establish stakeholder groups to support the national reporting process.
  - Identify relevant stakeholders and their engagement in defining the scope and the content of the assessment and allocate sufficient time for consultation.
  - Support the questionnaires with examples and good practices. The inclusion of examples and/or references, e.g. links to websites, documents, etc. is crucial to assessing progress achieved by countries in an objective way and would facilitate the exchange of experience and good practice.
