# Financial requirements for the implementation of the Convention\*,\*\*

### Note by the secretariat

### Summary

The present note sets out the financial requirements for the implementation of the Convention on Long-range Transboundary Air Pollution in 2024 and 2025. In particular, it outlines the needs for the Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe (EMEP), in accordance with the Protocol on Long-term Financing of the Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe (the EMEP Protocol), and financial information on activities to support implementation of the Convention and its Protocols in countries with economies in transition, and the work of the secretariat to support the intergovernmental activities under the Convention.

The note also presents recommendations to the Executive Body for the Convention, as required by the EMEP Protocol and Executive Body revised decision 2002/1 (ECE/EB.AIR/77/Add.1, annex I, ECE/EB.AIR/137, para. 54 (d), decision 2018/8, decision 2019/22, decision 2021/4 and decision 2022/5).

### Introduction

1. Section I of the present note sets out the financial requirements for 2024 for the Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe (EMEP), as required under article 5 of the Protocol on the Long-term Financing of the Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe (EMEP Protocol). Section II sets out the requirements for 2024 for the core activities not covered by the EMEP Protocol, as required by the Executive Body for the Convention on Long-range Transboundary Air Pollution in its revised decision 2002/1 (ECE/EB.AIR/77/Add.1, annex I, ECE/EB.AIR/137, para. 54 (d), decision 2018/8, decision 2019/22, decision 2021/4 and decision 2022/5). Section III sets out financial information on activities to support promotion and implementation of the Convention, and section IV provides information on the resource requirements for secretariat support to the intergovernmental activities under the Convention. The note also provides the basis for, and lists recommendations to the Executive Body, as required by the EMEP Protocol and revised decision 2002/1.

### I. Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe

2. Based on the decisions taken by the EMEP Steering Body and the Working Group on Effects at their ninth joint session (Geneva, 11–15 September 2023) (ECE/EB.AIR/GE.1/2023/2–ECE/EB.AIR/WG.1/2023/2, forthcoming), the present section reports on the status of the EMEP trust fund and the contributions by Parties, including those that are outstanding. It also presents a draft proposed detailed EMEP budget for 2024, a revised schedule of contributions for 2024 and a draft revised annex to the EMEP Protocol.

# A. Status of contributions to the trust fund and extrabudgetary contributions

3. The contributions paid by the Parties to the Convention for the long-term financing of EMEP are summarized in table 1 below. Payments in cash totalling \$1,989,511 were received by 25 September 2023. The expected cash contributions for 2023 to the trust fund from the following Parties were still outstanding: Belarus, France, Hungary, Montenegro, Republic of Moldova, Romania, Russian Federation, and Ukraine.

4. In addition to the contributions summarized in table 1 below, voluntary extrabudgetary contributions have been allocated directly to the EMEP centres. In 2022, Meteorological Synthesizing Centre-West (MSC-West) reported an in-kind contribution of \$789,211 (from Ministry of Climate and Environment, the Nordic Council of Ministers, Baltic Marine Environment Protection Commission (HELCOM), the Convention for the Protection of the Marine Environment of the North-East Atlantic (OSPAR), the European Union, the Norwegian Meteorological Institute), Centre for Integrated Assessment Modelling (CIAM) an in-kind contribution of \$182,151 (from International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis), Centre on Emission Inventories and Projections (CEIP) an in-kind contribution of \$222,274 (from Albania, Austria, Croatia, the European Union, Finland, France, the Netherlands, North Macedonia, Poland, Portugal, Serbia, Türkiye and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland), Meteorological Synthesizing Centre-East (MSC-E) an in-kind contribution of \$20,006 (from HELCOM), and Chemical Coordinating Centre (CCC) an in-kind contribution of \$2,919.

5. According to the secretariat's records, the total arrears in cash and in kind by 1 January 2023 stood at \$270,463 while the arrears by 1 January 2022 stood at \$2,742.

6. As of 1 January 2023, the following Parties still had outstanding contributions: Bosnia and Herzegovina (for 2022); Liechtenstein (for 2021, 2022); Portugal (for 2021 (partially)), Republic of Moldova (for 2018, 2019, and 2020), North Macedonia (for 2022), Romania (for 2022), Russian Federation (for 2022), Türkiye (for 2022), Ukraine (for 2022). As of 25 September 2023, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Liechtenstein, Portugal, North Macedonia,

Romania, and Türkiye have paid their arrears. In a letter dated 2 August 2023<sup>1</sup>, the Russian Federation informed the ECE secretariat that it had paid its outstanding mandatory contributions to the EMEP Trust Fund for 2022 and 2023 directly to the MSC-East.

### B. Budget and mandatory contributions for 2023

7. At its forty-second session (Geneva, 12-16 December 2022), the Executive Body approved the detailed use of resources in 2023 in the amount of \$2,358,700 and requested the Steering Body, with the assistance of its Bureau, to present the details of the 2024 budget for approval by the Executive Body at its forty-third session (ECE/EB.AIR/150, para.37 (a) and (g)). At their ninth joint session, the EMEP Steering Body and the Working Group on Effects agreed to forward the draft detailed EMEP budget for 2024 to the Executive Body for further consideration. Table 2 below presents the details of the EMEP budget for 2024 as proposed by the EMEP Steering Body Bureau.

8. The Steering Body and the Working Group further noted that the value of the total budget has been eroded by approximately a third across the last 15 years, and that it was now insufficient to fund priority work items and requested that this matter be brought to the attention of the Executive Body.

9. At its forty-first session (Geneva, 6–8 December 2021), the Executive Body requested the secretariat to present a revised annex to the EMEP Protocol and a revised scale of mandatory contributions for 2023, based on the most recent United Nations scale of assessments, for consideration at the forty-second session in 2022. A revised schedule of contributions was presented to the Executive Body at its forty-second session. However, the Executive Body decided to apply in 2023 the previously approved schedule of mandatory contributions, as set out in table 3 of document ECE/EB.AIR/2021/1 (ECE/EB.AIR/150, para. 37 (e)). The schedule of mandatory contributions for 2024, based on the 2021 United Nations scale of assessment is presented in table 3 below. A draft revised annex to the EMEP Protocol is set out in the annex to the present document.

#### C. Proposed decisions

10. The Executive Body may wish to:

(a) Decide on the detailed use of resources in 2024;

(b) Agree on the schedule of mandatory contributions from Parties for 2024 as set out in table 3 below;

(c) Recognize insufficient funding for the work under the EMEP Protocol and support the Steering Body's call on the Parties to the EMEP Protocol to consider making additional voluntary contributions (in-kind or in cash through the trust fund) to ensure that the work, especially additional work that might be required in light of the future revision of the Gothenburg Protocol, can be accomplished as foreseen in the draft 2024–2025 workplan for the implementation of the Convention (ECE/EB.AIR/2023/1);

(d) Request the Steering Body, with the assistance of its Bureau, to present the details of the 2025 budget for approval by the Executive Body at its forty-fourth session;

(e) Urge Parties that have not yet done so to pay their 2023 contributions in cash to the trust fund and, in 2024, to pay their contributions so that they reach the trust fund in the first half of the year;

(f) Urge Parties with arrears to pay them in full to the trust fund;

(g) Amend the EMEP Protocol by adopting, in accordance with article 4, paragraph 3, of the Protocol, the revised annex set out in the annex to the present document;

(h) Decide on the status of the contribution of the Russian Federation to MSC-E.

### II. Core activities not covered by the Protocol on Long-term Financing of the Cooperative Programme for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Long-range Transmission of Air Pollutants in Europe

11. The present section sets out the financial requirements for core activities not funded through the EMEP Protocol, based on decisions taken at the ninth joint session of the EMEP Steering Body and the Working Group on Effects. It reports, as specified in revised decision 2002/1, on the contributions from Parties, both in cash and in kind, made in 2022 and 2023. It presents for the Executive Body's consideration a budget for 2024 and provisional budgets for 2025 and 2026. It also presents a recommended scale of contributions for 2024 based on the most recent United Nations scale of assessments.

# A. Contributions from Parties in 2022 and 2023 and the use of contributions

12. At its forty-second session, the Executive Body decided to adopt a total budget for 2023 of \$2,358,700 for the core activities not funded by the EMEP Protocol (ECE/EB.AIR/150 para. 39 (c)).

13. Throughout 2022 and in 2023, Parties made cash contributions to the trust fund in accordance with revised decision 2002/1. Tables 4 (2022 contributions in cash) and 5 (2023 contributions in cash, as of 25 September) below identify the contributions recommended to Parties by the Executive Body, as well as the actual contributions made.

14. For 2022, a total of 40 Parties made contributions totalling \$2,605,185, of which \$1,791,332 were contributions in kind directly to the centres and \$813,853 were contributions in cash to the trust fund.

15. As of 25 September 2023, as allowed under revised decision 2002/1, Germany, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland informed the secretariat of their in-kind contributions for 2022 and 2023. These contributions are presented in tables 6 and 7 below. Table 8 below presents recorded contributions to fund the effects-oriented activities in 2022. The use of earmarked and non-earmarked cash contributions for the period 2013–2023 is presented in table 9 below.

16. Contracts for the current year are drawn up on the basis of contributions made by Parties to the trust fund in the preceding year. Non-earmarked contributions are divided equally between the centres.

17. The Executive Body may wish to note the additional contributions made by the lead countries of the programmes and by the countries hosting the centres. A number of Parties also provided additional support through hosting task force meetings, workshops and/or expert meetings.

# **B.** Budget and contributions required for 2024 and provisional budgets for 2025 and 2026

18. At its forty-second session, the Executive Body decided that the budget for financing the core activities not funded by the EMEP Protocol, would provisionally be \$2,358,700 (including 3 per cent programme support costs) in 2024 and \$2,358,700 in 2025. The details of the budget for the different elements of the effects-oriented activities (international coordination costs), as approved at the ninth joint session of the EMEP Steering Body and the Working Group on Effects are presented in table 10.

19. A recommended scale of contributions for 2024, based on the most recent United Nations scale of assessments, is set out in table 12 below.

20. The Working Group recommended to the Executive Body to agree on provisional budgets for 2025 and 2026 of \$2,358,700 per year for the costs of core activities.

### C. Proposed decisions

21. The Executive Body may wish to:

(a) Note the contributions made to the trust fund for effects-oriented activities for 2022 and 2023;

(b) Urge all Parties that have not yet done so to provide the recommended contributions to the trust fund for financing core activities without undue delay, taking into account that the continuation of the International Cooperative Programmes is dependent on long-term funding;

(c) Decide that the essential international coordination costs for financing the core activities of the Convention and its protocols, other than those covered by the EMEP Protocol, shall be \$2,358,700 in 2024, and shall provisionally be \$2,358,700 in 2025 and \$2,358,700 in 2026;

(d) Agree on the recommended schedule of contributions from Parties for 2024, as set out in table 11 below;

(e) Request the secretariat to inform Parties of the recommended contributions to the trust fund to meet the 2024 budget, inviting them to make these contributions as agreed in revised decision 2002/1, and before 30 November 2024;

(f) Note with appreciation the essential support provided to the Convention and its bodies by lead countries, countries hosting centres and those organizing meetings, as well as countries that fund activities of their national focal centres/points and the active participation of national experts;

(g) Invite the secretariat to provide information on the amount of contributions made to the trust fund for effects-oriented activities as of 30 November 2024 at the forty-fourth session of the Executive Body, and to use the amount as a basis to fund the effects-oriented activities in 2025;

(h) Decide that, in the event that the amount of contributions is lower than the agreed costs of \$2,358,700, unearmarked contributions should be divided equally between the centres.

### **III.** Promotion and implementation of the Convention

22. This section covers the financing of activities included in section IV (capacitybuilding) and section V (communication, awareness-raising, outreach and cooperation) of the workplan for the implementation of the Convention.

#### A. Contributions and expenditures in 2022 and 2023

23. At its forty-first session, the Executive Body adopted the budget for 2022–2023 of \$1,860,000 for promotion and implementation of the Convention in Eastern Europe, South-Eastern Europe, the Caucasus and Central Asia, as well as in Türkiye.

24. In 2022, contributions were received from Germany, Norway, and Switzerland totalling \$272,744. In 2023, (as of 25 September 2023) contributions were received from the European Union, Germany and Nordic Council of Ministers totalling \$425,121 (table 12 below). Some of the contributions received in 2022 were spent in 2023, and some contributions received in 2023 will be utilized in late 2023.

25. Expenditures in 2022 totalled \$718,721 and estimated expenditures in 2023 as of 25 September 2023 totalled \$411,016 (table 13 below). These covered the costs of organization and facilitation of workshops and meetings, other consultancy costs, and secretariat staff support to activities under sections IV and V of the 2022-2023 workplan for the implementation of the Convention.

# **B.** Required resources for capacity building and communication, awareness-raising, outreach and cooperation activities for 2024-2025

26. The proposed budget for 2024–2025 for capacity-building activities to promote ratification and implementation, included in section IV of the draft 2024-2025 workplan for the implementation of the Convention, is \$1,745,618. The details per year are presented in table 14 below.

27. The proposed budget for 2024–2025 for communication, awareness-raising, outreach and cooperation, included in section V of the draft 2024-2025 workplan for the implementation of the Convention, is \$724,710. The details per year are presented in table 15 below.

### C. Proposed decisions

28. The Executive Body may wish to:

(a) Note the contributions made by a number of Parties to the trust funds for capacity building and awareness-raising activities in 2022 and 2023 and thank those Parties for the payments made;

(b) Decide that the budget for capacity building to promote ratification and implementation in 2024-2025 will be \$1,745,618;

(c) Decide that the budget for communication, awareness-raising, outreach and cooperation activities in 2024-2025 will be \$724,710;

(d) Note the pledges already made by some Parties and organizations to fund the activities in section IV (capacity-building) and section V (communication, awareness-raising, outreach and cooperation) of the draft workplan for the implementation of the Convention;

(e) Invite Parties to provide voluntary contributions without delay to ensure the successful implementation of the activities spelled out in sections IV and V of the draft 2024-2025 workplan for the implementation of the Convention.

### **IV.** Intergovernmental activities

29. At its twenty-fourth session (Geneva, 11-14 December 2006), the Executive Body adopted decision 2006/12, in which it agreed that travel by secretariat staff to Convention meetings or meetings where they represent the Convention, should, wherever possible, be funded through a United Nations trust fund (ECE/EB.AIR/89/Add.1). The dedicated trust fund since then has been used to not only to cover the cost of travel, but also to support specific activities of the secretariat.

30. In 2022, Norway contributed \$30,562. In 2023, there were no cash contributions received as of 15 September 2023. Germany provided a voluntary contribution funding a post through a Junior Profession Officers (JPO) programme for the period October 2022 – October 2024.

31. In 2022, related expenditures amounted to \$40,358, including programme support costs. As of 15 September 2023, the expenditures for 2023 amounted to \$80,059, including programme support costs. These covered the cost of official travel by secretariat staff to meetings relevant for the Convention and funding of a temporary position to support the activities under the Convention.

32. At the forty-second session of the Executive Body, the secretariat presented a note on "Resources for the secretariat to support the core functioning of the Convention" (ECE/EB.AIR/2022/9), explaining the funding mechanisms for different activities under the Convention, as well as the resource requirements to support the intergovernmental activities under the Convention and possible options for addressing the needs. For 2023, the Executive Body opted for streamlining certain activities.

33. Following consultations with the Bureau of the Executive Body, the secretariat assessed the resource requirements to support its essential functions and the activities included in the draft 2024-2025 workplan for the implementation of the Convention, in addition to resources provided by the ECE under the United Nations regular budget. The resource requirements for 2025 are presented in table 16 below. An indicative scale of contributions to fund these activities is presented in an accompanying informal document.

34. The secretariat prepared a proposal for prioritizing its activities in 2024, taking into account the existing resource gaps, and included it in an accompanying informal document.

35. Table 17 presents a consolidated table of all resource requirements for the implementation of the Convention in 2024-2025, other than those provided by the United Nations regular budget.

36. The Executive Body may wish to:

(a) Take note of the resource requirements for intergovernmental activities under the Convention in 2025, as well as the indicative scale of recommended contributions contained in an accompanying informal document, and invites Parties to make contributions;

(b) Acknowledge the contribution of Germany through the JPO programme and encourage mobilization of resources in 2024 for the extension of the JPO post beyond October 2024;

(c) Note the pledges already made by some Parties;

(d) Decide on the priority activities of the secretariat in 2024;

(e) Take note of the overview of all resource requirements for the implementation of the Convention in 2024-2025, as presented in table 17.
