**Fourth Joint Aarhus Convention and Convention on Biological Diversity
Roundtable on Public Awareness, Education, Access to Information, Public Participation and
Access to Justice regarding Living Modified Organisms/Genetically Modified Organisms¹**

11-12 December 2023, Geneva, Switzerland

PROVISIONAL PROGRAMME

Background

1. The roundtable is organized under the auspices of the UNECE Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters (Aarhus Convention) and the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety to the Convention on Biological Diversity. The roundtable aims to contribute to strengthening countries' capacities by sharing knowledge, experiences and lessons learned in promoting public awareness, education, access to information, public participation in decision-making and access to justice regarding living modified organisms/genetically modified organisms (LMOs/GMOs) and developing suggestions for concrete future actions.
2. The roundtable is expected to take stock of successes and challenges, and identify synergies in relation to the promotion of effective implementation of the Aarhus Convention in the context of LMOs/GMOs, its amendment on public participation in decisions on deliberate release into the environment and placing on the market of GMOs (Almaty Amendment on GMOs), the guidelines on access to information, public participation and access to justice with respect to GMOs (Lucca Guidelines) to the Aarhus Convention, and the provisions of Article 23 of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety, regarding public awareness, education and participation.
3. The roundtable is organized under the leadership and with the support of the Government of Austria and will be chaired by Mr. Helmut Gaugitsch.
4. The outcomes of the event are intended to facilitate the ratification and implementation of the Aarhus Convention in the context of LMOs/GMOs, its Almaty Amendment on GMOs and the implementation of Article 23 of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety as well as Targets 17 and 22 of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF), in the context of LMOs/GMOs, thereby also contributing to the achievement of relevant Sustainable Development Goals.
5. The results of the round table will be reported to the twenty-eighth meeting of the Working Group of the Parties to the Aarhus Convention (Geneva, July 2024) and the eighth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Aarhus Convention (2025) and shared with the eleventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (21 October 2024–1 November 2024, tentative).

6. The joint roundtable is organized pursuant to Decision II/1 and Decision VII/5 of the Meeting of the Parties to the Aarhus Convention, which call for cooperation between the Aarhus Convention and the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety with a view to maximizing synergies and avoiding duplication of effort, and in accordance with decision 15/4 of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (COP) and decisions CP-10/4, CP-10/3, VIII/6, BS-II/6 and BS-II/13 of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (COP-MOP).

7. The roundtable will feature several panel discussions on the following topics: (a) challenges and good practices in ratifying and implementing the Aarhus Convention's Almaty Amendment on GMOs and in implementing Article 23 of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety; (b) access to information; (c) public awareness and education; (d) public participation and (e) access to justice. There will also be a training session on access to justice.

8. Participants will be provided with a "learning journal" prior to the meeting to take notes of the discussions and reflect on key points from the roundtable to bring back to their countries.

9. Rapporteurs for each panel discussion will be designated by the Chair. They will be invited to report at the final session of the meeting highlighting the key outcomes of the discussions.

10. The outcomes of the panel discussions will be used as a basis for future actions to assist Parties, other interested Governments and stakeholders in furthering efforts on access to information, awareness raising, public participation, education and access to justice.
