What is the Protocol on Water and Health?

- International legally binding treaty adopted in 1999, in force since 2005: 29 Parties as of June 2024, 2 at final stage of accession, over 40 countries cooperating
- **Objective**: protect human health and well-being through sustainable water management and by preventing and controlling water-related diseases
- Scope: entire water cycle protection of water resources, drinking water supply chain from catchment to consumption, sanitation chain from collection and treatment of wastewater to discharge and reuse, water used for recreation
- UNECE and WHO/Europe jointly provide secretariat functions



Unique characteristics:

First and only treaty that focuses on water, sanitation, hygiene and health;

Combines environmental protection with promotion of human health;

Precursor and accelerator of SDG6

Human rights to safe drinking water and sanitation: synergies with the Protocol

- 2010: UNGA explicitly recognized the human right to water and sanitation acknowledging that clean drinking water and sanitation are essential to the realisation of all human rights (<u>Resolution 64/292</u>)
- 2015: UNGA recognized the existence of two separate human rights to water and sanitation (<u>Resolution 70/169</u>)

Legal content of the human rights to water and sanitation and the Protocol:

- Availability (articles 5 and 6 of the Protocol)
- Accessibility (articles 5(I), 6)
- Acceptability
- Affordability (articles 5 and 6)
- Quality/safety (article 6.2 of the Protocol)

How HR principles are reflected in the Protocol:

- Accountability: reporting by Parties (art. 7) + Compliance Committee (art. 15)
- **Participation**: many rights entitled to the public (art. 5, 9, 10, 15)
- **Sustainability**: focus on prevention (art. 5) and whole water cycle (art. 3)
- Non-discrimination: focus on "equitable access" (art. 5 and 6)









Main obligations: target setting and reporting under the Protocol

Parties to the Protocol and other countries set, monitor and regularly review national/local **intersectoral targets** on water, sanitation, hygiene and health Targets are developed following an in-depth baseline analysis and through a participatory target setting process, bringing together environment and health sectors

Countries report on progress every three years to Meeting of the Parties through submission of national summary reports. The Compliance Committee provides assistance and support to countries

Protocol reporting provides a data hub, with harmonized information on water, sanitation, hygiene and health Development of an

electronic tool for reporting








No One Left Behind (2012)

Help to identify equity gaps through a self-assessment exercise. Update of the EA Scre-card in progress!




Guidance Note on equitable access action plans (2016)

Strengthening action in Uzbekistan and water and sanitation and protection of water resources from accidental pollution in the face of climate change project

Funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC)

Dec 2023 – Dec 2026

Jointly implemented by the UNECE Industrial Accidents Convention and the Protocol on Water and Health

High-level launch 14 March in Tashkent

Significant Protocol-related project outcomes (vis-à-vis HR to water and sanitation):

- **Outcome 1**: strengthened national governance on water and sanitation and climate resilience through implementation of the Protocol
- **Outcome 3**: increased political and public awareness on water and sanitation

Examples of activities:

- development of integrated and climate resilient targets on water, sanitation, hygiene and health based on consultative multistakeholder process;

- sensitizing of the public/population in a target municipality/region on relevant water issues (e.g. water saving, water quality, sanitation) jointly with local partners;
- awareness-raising targeted to specific stakeholders (e.g. rural authorities, schools, water operators) identified in the baseline analysis

- information and communication materials (e.g. project results and lessons learned)

42 Parties, 30th anniversary of the Convention in 2022, Assistance and Cooperation Programme (since 2004) to support countries with economies in transition, Natech & TMFs in Convention's scope

Guidance & tools



Practical application

- Inventories & Maps of >1000 TMFs in the Danube River Basin & Central Asia
- On-site trainings at TMFs to build capacity & understand risks
- Creation of Interinstitutional Working Groups on Tailings Safety and the Prevention of Accidental Water Pollution (IIWGs) in KZ & TJ
- Strengthened subregional/transboundary cooperation on tailings safety

UNECE INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS CONVENTION

Human rights and climate change: what does the Convention do?

HUMAN RIGHTS

- Avoids deaths and illnesses from hazardous chemicals by reducing the risk of technological disasters releasing chemical substances
- → ARTICLE 3 UDHR
- Prevents accidental (drinking)water pollution from industrial accidents
- → ARTICLE 25 UDHR
- Involves the public in discussions related to prevention of, preparedness for and response to industrial accidents
- → ARTICLE 8 UDHR
- Thus, provides an effective mechanism for protecting populations, the environment and economies from industrial accidents occurring within and across national borders

CLIMATE CHANGE

- Strengthens resilience to climate-related hazards and natural disasters by promoting adequate siting, land-use policies and emergency plans
- Provides a framework to prevent accidental release of chemicals, thus contributing to their environmentally sound management
- Improves governance and capacity in the areas of prevention of accidental water pollution, and resilience to climate change, incl. through transboundary cooperation and regional exchange
- Reflects on growing amount and increased severity of natural hazards by providing guidelines on natural-hazard-triggered technological disasters (NATECH events)



High-level Launch event and technical workshops

Tashkent, 14 March 2024

- Representatives from national Uzbek authorities, SDC, UN in Uzbekistan, UNECE and civil society
- All-encompassing approach to issues related to water, environment and health
- Further work on subregional **cooperation** and cooperation with different national authorities
- **Support climate change resilience**, access to and safety of quality water and sanitation services
- Open dialogue and trust building between government authorities, partner organizations and civil society
- information and knowledge sharing about the upcoming activities planned under the new project, incl. through press conference, and synergies with other projects and relevant activities
- Followed by Technical Workshops

Examples of the planned activities

Support to Uzbekistan towards accession to the Industrial Accidents Convention, including draft law on accession, roadmap on the accession

Subregional workshop for Central Asian countries to exchange good practices on tailings safety and prevention of accidental water pollution Support to Uzbekistan in establishment of the national governance mechanism on tailings safety and preventing accidental water pollution

Support to the Joint Uzbek-Kazakh Working Group in the **Syr Darya River Basin**, also involving Tajikistan and Kyrgyzstan




