Indicator of achievement: division-specific action plans issued to operationalize the three ECE strategies	Important	In light of the sequencing between recommendation 3 and 1 (with recommendation 3 to be implemented on the basis, i.e. subsequently to recommendation 1), so far mainly initial, internal exploratory actions have taken place for this recommendation. For example, increasing attention is given to the Division's engagement with and contribution to ECE-wide strategies. As regards ECE's Technical Cooperation Strategy and Working Group, repeated engagement with the Divisions' Regional Advisor (one Regional Advisor supporting two sub-programmes) aimed at identifying challenges and opportunities are being undertaken with a view to charting the best way forward. As regards ECE's Partnership Strategy, ECTD is working to ensure that each normative body, at least at the level of Sectoral Committees, has an opportunity to consider partnerships with UN and other actions. This is typically, addressed as a specific self-standing agenda item in the annual meeting. Additionally, the partnership- based approach in response to the decisions of the 70 th Commission session was presented to Sectoral Committees and UN/CEFACT at the 2024 June and July sessions. Important	With a view to charting the way forward, ECTD started by taking stock of examples documenting the successful integration of gender, environment, human rights and disability in ECTD work streams. Examples include (i) For gender: the recently established Team of Specialists on Gender Responsive Standards (ToS GRS), which developed and adopted a "Code List for sex and gender in digitalized information exchange", the inclusion of gender aspects into the ECE Evaluation Methodology on PPPs (PIERS) and respective activities (in May 2023, UNECE's Annual International PPP Forum, hosted in Athens, Greece, convened several sessions on gender equality and women's empowerment in PPP; in November 2023, the WP.PPP launched work on a practical	In progress Target date: 31 December 2025

As regards Trade Facilitation, for example, the 2023 ECE Regional Report shows that the the 'women in trade facilitation' subgroup reached an average implementation rate for the ECE region of 36%, with a slight increase from 27% in 2021. The implementation rate varies widely across country groups. The measures that has the best implementation rate is: 'women's membership in the NTFC (National Trade Facilitation Committees) or similar bodies', currently being implemented by 39 countries, reaching an implementation rate of 38%. https://unece.org/sites/default/files/2024-07/ECE TRADE 483E.pdf	uate
			(ii) For environment the two standards on PPPs for the Circular Economy (Guidelines on Promoting Circular Economy in PPPs for the SDGs and Guidelines on PPPs for the Sustainable Development Goals in Waste-to-Energy Projects for Non-Recyclable Waste: Pathways towards a Circular Economy), the Code of Good Practice for Reducing Food Loss, the Team of Specialists for Sustainable Value Chains for the Circular Economy, and the continued expansion of the Sustainability Pledge are noteworthy. As regards the latter, the Sustainability Pledge, a flagship initiative supporting the traceability of environmental, social and governance (ESG) compliance in circular value chains, reached 100+ pledges from 750+ industry actors in the textiles and clothing sector. The ECE Sustainability Pledge toolbox was tested in 20 blockchain pilots covering 23 countries across the world. ECTD experts are working to replicate this initiative in the agrifood and critical raw materials (CRMs) sectors).	
			The ECTD-serviced normative machinery also provided a setting for member States to discuss Circular Economy initiatives, such as information exchange standards for Digital Product Passport (DPPs) (UN/CEFACT, November 2023) or suggestions for integrating Circular Economy considerations into UNECE Studies on RPBTs (Trade Committee, June 2023).	
			ECTD also services the Circular STEP network, which provides a vibrant stakeholder engagement platform for more than 25	

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			government-nominated focal points. This includes 16 focal points from countries with economies in transition, many of whom met at our first Circular STEP Regional Dialogue in Belgrade, Serbia in October 2023. This also includes in-depth coverage of circularity-related issues at the first Regional Conference on Circular Economy held in June 2024 in Geneva, on the occasion of the two Sectoral Committees serviced by the Division. (iii) For human rights, entry points already yielded results (the Sustainability Pledge for Textiles and Footwear, the PPP work stream). For example, following regular consultations with experts helping to shape the way forward (several meetings with the Special Rapporteur on the Right to Development, were held in 2023 and with the "Business and Human Rights" community),. a session was held at the UNECE 8th PPP Forum May 2024 focusing on "equal access", with panellists addressing the question: In what ways do the UNECE's PPPs for the SDGs approach and the PIERS platform support the incorporation of a human-rights-based approach in PPPs? Similarly, human rights issues are also addressed as part of the tracing of ESG (environmental, social and governance) aspects of value chains in the context of the ECE Sustainability Pledge. (iv) As regards the inclusion of disability in ECTD work streams, the work stream on Gender Responsive Standards (GRS) and on PPPs work (PIERS indicators and new work on stakeholder engagement) provide entry points. This is in addition to specific indicators on disability responsiveness and targets to be included in future PPP XB projects.
